1 MU USB ADAPTER

If you're sick of lugging bulky mains chargers about with you, the Mu universal USB adapter is going to make you smile. Simply plug your USB charging cable into the Mu, plug the other end into your phone, then slot the Mu into your mains as usual. Doesn't sound like anything special, but the Mu folds up into a tiny pocket-sized square when not in use, taking up almost no space in your bag or case. 2 ENERGENIE CHARGEGENIE

Another portable charger, but this one can be easily used while operating your mobile thanks to the sticky gel pad, which fixes the Chargegenie right to the back of your phone. You then simply plug the built-in micro USB cable into your phone (so this won't work with Apple products) and your device immediately starts charging. You get almost a full recharge per use, and the Chargegenie can be refilled by sticking it into a computer. The handy indicator lights show how much charge remains. We were pleased to see the gel pads can be quickly and easily cleaned, so you can reuse it as much as you want. The only downside is it adds considerable bulk to your phone while in use. energenie4u.co.uk • £20

STK GROOVEZ HEADPHONES

love listening to music but hate trailing cables, so Bluetooth headphones are our best friends. The STK Groovez charge via USB, so hook them up to your PC until they're ready and then activate Bluetooth on your phone or tablet and the two will pair up with just a tap. The Groovez are comfortable to wear, with plenty of padding, and fold up neatly for travel. You get play/pause/skip/volume controls on the outsides, which work fine with most music apps (although Bloom,FM songs wouldn't unpause for some random reason), Sound quality is crisp and clean but voices seem a little weak compared to more expensive headphones, sometimes sounding echoey. For the price, however, the Groovez do the job.

JABRA REVO WIRELESS - £199

Premium looks, a premium feel and premium performance make these wireless mixture of metal, rubber and plastic, to the fact 'left' and 'right' are written on the inside of the cups, it's clear a ton of thought has gone into the Revo wireless headphones. An inbuilt mic means they can be used as a headset, and the sides can be touched to control volume and skip tracks, while they also come with an app that controls Dolby sound and offers various graphic equalisers. Whichever you choose, the bass is super rich. The battery will give you a respectable 12 hours of use, and the Bluetooth range is about 10 meters with no obstacles. Although these headphones are wireless, they come with a lovely orange fabric cable too, and are also NFC compatible, so just tap them onto your phone and you're ready to go. Jabra might not be one of the first names to pop into your head when you think of high-end personal audio, but that's all going to change if the company carries on like this.

Coolest of all is how they make a noise like a sad, dying robot when you turn Bluetooth off. An all-round classy product.

you're paranoid about someone running off with your gear when you're out in public, the hipKey is one way of keeping thieves at bay. This tiny gadget has a number of settings, which alert you to suspect behaviour – for instance, the notion sensor will sound an alarm on both the hipKey and your iPhone if the device is moved, useful for making sure no one tampers with your bag. A proximity alarm alerts you if your phone and hipKey become separated, another useful anti-theft feature, and you can even set up a GPS 'safe zone' around a set location. FREEDOM I-CONNEX BLUETOOTH KEYBOARD

The Freedom i-Connex is a nifty folding keyboard that will connect to almost any Bluetooth device. It's powered by just two AAA batteries which offers almost 100 hours of use - impressive.

The alphabet keys are almost full-size, however the spacebar is much smaller and

doesn't always register. It's not the most attractive of accessories and doesn't feel particularly premium, but it does what it was intended to do without a fuss. The folding gimmick and free tablet stand are big bonuses too.
